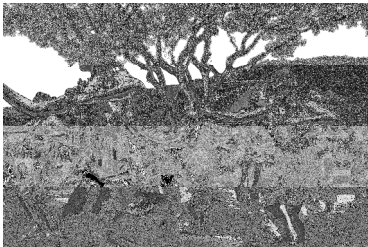
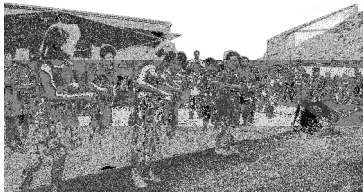

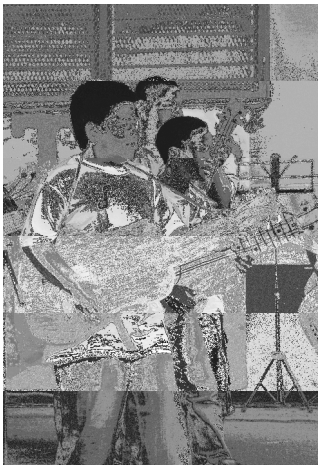

Aloha au i ku'u tūtū . . .

Kupuna are special people who nurture future generations. They are the keepers of history and tradition to whom we look to for guidance and inspiration.

On Thursday, March 1, Ānuenuē will honor kūpuna with the celebration of our 17th annual Lā Kūpuna (grandparent's day). Students are encouraged to invite their kūpuna to spend the morning on campus where they will be entertained by the students and served a delicious lunch.

The Lā Kūpuna celebration begins with the students sharing a welcome oli followed by a program of mele, hula, and oli prepared especially for the kūpuna. During the program, kupuna are recognized as their names are read aloud and their mo'opuna welcome them with a gift of aloha. The program concludes with a lunch of beef stew, rice, poi, and cake.

Last year we welcomed over 400 kūpuna to Lā Kūpuna and expect to do the same this year. Please encourage your child to invite his/her kūpuna to join us on Thursday, March 1, for a special day in their honor.

What you need to know:

- ***Lunch is complimentary for all KŪPUNA*** (of Ānuenuē haumāna)

To reserve a complimentary lunch for your child's kūpuna, please complete the Lunch Reservation form and return to your child's teacher before the end of the school day on Friday, February 24. We will not be able to accept forms after this day.

- ***Other Guests***

A limited number of lunches are available for purchase. To purchase a lunch, please complete the Lunch Reservation form and return to your child's teacher with payment (checks payable to *Ānuenuē*). Forms without payment will be returned.

- **Students** will have school lunch in their classrooms. Because tent space is limited, students WILL NOT be able to have lunch with their kūpuna.
